We know that children who enter kindergarten without key school readiness skills are likely to remain academically behind their peers throughout their school years and are at very high risk of not completing high school. In addition, children are less likely to be ready for school if their parents have low education levels, low incomes, are young, are single parents or have limited English skills. Unfortunately, as many as half of all children under age five in Aurora have one or more of these risk factors. On June 14, 2011, Fox Valley United Way and the City of Aurora co-hosted an early learning strategy summit,

bringing together elected officials, schools, business leaders and social service agencies to discuss how to join forces to provide the best possible learning opportunities for Aurora's youngest citizens. The Success By 6 Early Learning Council was borne out of this event and is working to increase access by identifying gaps, facilitating strategic partnerships to maximize resources, coordinating service delivery and leveraging funding to create a system of early childhood education to serve every preschooler in Aurora. Our sincerest thanks to all of the following donors who qualified for this year's Leadership Giving Society. Their gifts of \$1,000 or more have made a significant impact in our communities this year.
