Fox Valley households, individuals and businesses came together during another difficult economy to meet the challenge of helping their friends and neighbors. The following data indicate where funds were raised and how they were distributed during our 2009–2010 campaign.

Where We Raise Money

We obtain funds from three basic and traditional sources: workplace fundraising campaigns, corporate contributions and individual donations.



Where We Allocate Funds

We allocate funds based upon requests from our 57 partner agencies to support specific programs. Generally, our funding priorities fall into four high-impact community need categories: Basic human needs...homelessness...children and youth...and seniors.
